

BORDEAUX, france

Bordeaux is France's largest winegrowing region, comprising approximately 280,000 acres of vineyards and making millions of cases of wine annually. The region is defined by its history, its blue-chip wines and, like most Old World regions, its complex appellation system through which wines are categorized by geographic origin.

Today, all the leading châteaus, whether they sell for $\$ 20$ a bottle or $\$ 2,000$, take the utmost care of their vineyards, which in most instances are planted to Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and Cabernet Franc. Red Bordeaux is nearly always a blended wine, and labels rarely indicate grape varieties, as they do in California or Australia. Instead, they indicate the producer's name and the origin of the wine, or its appellation.

70\% Merlot, 30\% Cabernet Sauvignon

Grown in the Macau en Medoc, the vineyard is 7 hectares on white clay soils located on the border of Margaux. Varietals planted are 70\% Merlot and 30\% Cabernet Sauvignon. Sustainable viticulture is practiced in the vineyard.

The harvested fruit is fully destemmed into temperature-controlled stainless steel tanks and concrete vats for fermentation with 3 daily pump overs. Matured in stainless steel for 6 months.

A medium-bodied, approachable claret with juicy berry fruit backed up by savory tobacco notes. Classically proportioned and elegantly balanced.

Away from the glamour and hype of the top fifty-plus châteaux, the quiet revolution continues in Bordeaux, with these uniquely digestible wines benefiting from the gloss of modern winemaking while retaining their trademark elegance and savoriness.
